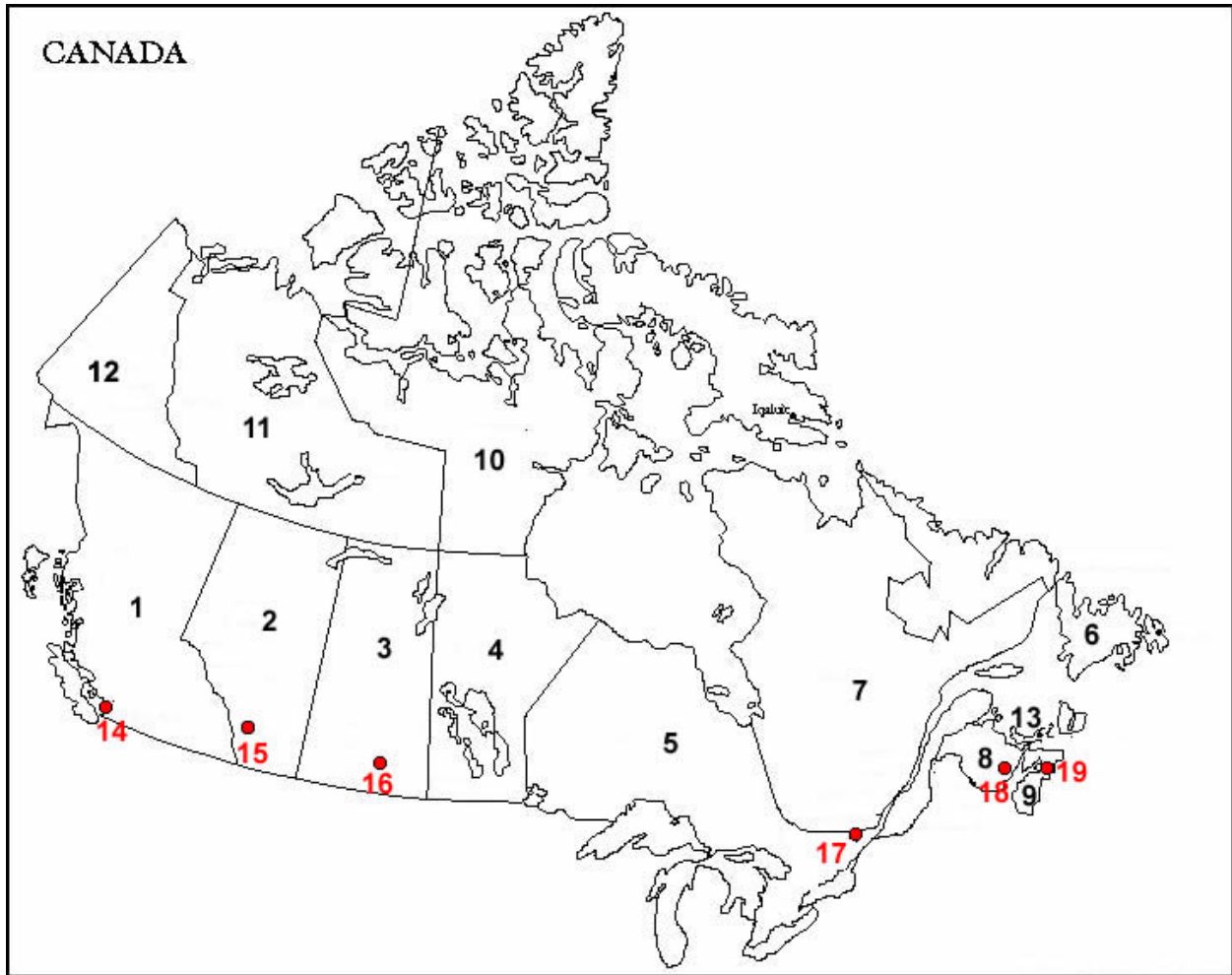

3). Final Exam Reading

a). Read *The End of History* found on the course website. You will be required to answer one short answer question on this particular reading.

b). There are three other essays based on the Canada: The Crucible readings. You will be required to answer *one* of these three essays.

i). In a standard five paragraph essay, explain what Canada's role was in Afghanistan, describe actions taken by Canadians radicalized as jihadists in Canada, and describe how Canada responded to the Syrian Civil War and Isis.

ii). In a standard five paragraph essay, provide a detailed description of Canada's role and actions/inaction in the fight against climate change from the Stockholm Declaration (1972) all the way to the most recent agreement reached in Paris (2015). In your answer make reference to the relevant accords, agreements, science, etc.

iii). In a standard five paragraph essay, explain the causes of the global economic meltdown, why Canada emerged from the crisis relatively unscathed, and the protest movements which emerged in response to the crisis.
